June Meeting Minutes. . .

Bruce Berger opened the 771st meeting of the Amateur Telescope Makers of Boston with a warm welcome to our featured speaker, Todd Gross – Chief meteorologist at Boston's Channel 7 News Station. Todd spoke to us about determining ideal conditions for observing which include both transparency and seeing. In addition Todd spoke about what causes these conditions and why this part of the country has the conditions it does as opposed to a place like Florida. He used the active web service provided at Phillips Auditorium to take us via his web site, www.weatherman.com to a weather modeling site that shows pressure gradients, and therefore air movement patterns at various levels of the atmosphere from ground level up to 18,000 feet where the jet stream exists. He showed us how one can look for areas of high pressure ridges at both low and high levels. Based on investigations he feels that the probability for excellent conditions are highest when these exist at both levels. Using the latest maps he showed the jet stream over us - a common condition and the large high pressure ridge over the southern portion of the country – another common condition. This, he said, explains why the seeing is often much better when one goes to Florida compared to New England views. In order to judge the current seeing Todd suggested a few indicators. With a 16" or greater aperture he suggested looking at M57 with two prominent stars just outside the ring at 14th and 15th mag, along with a dim double star and of course the central star. For medium sized scope he suggested the Trapezium cluster in M42. We often see four stars but on nights of excellent seeing we should easily see six. For smaller scopes in the 4" range he suggested looking for craterlets on the floor of the large crater Plato. One is easy, 6-7 indicates good seeing, 8-9 indicates great seeing. Todds main point: Once you know your conditions – choose your observing to match the conditions. Be it big nebula, tight nebula, double stars or planets and the moon pick your objects based on the seeing and transparency and you will never have a bad night of observing.

The business meeting followed the talk including standard reports by committee members and club officers. Bernie Volz presented the annual treasurers report for Gary Jacobson. John reed reported that for the last 3 months there had been 42 member days of work done up at the club house and thanked all those that have helped out. Bruce Berger announced two star parties in Chelmsford and Eileen Myers reminded us of the upcoming club picnic. Tonight was Bruce Berger's last night as President and for his last duty in that capacity for the club he presented certificates of appreciation to a number of persons he felt had put effort into the club above and beyond the normal call. Ten certificates were presented. Their names are listed later in the newsletter. Bruce then presented the slate of officers nominated for the next year. After verifying that no other nominations had been presented to the secretary, Paul Valleli motioned that we accept the slate of officers as is.

The membership present voted unanimously to accept. New executive board member and president of the club, Bernie Volz then took over the meeting. First order of business was to vote on a July meeting which was voted in favor. New business included the resignation of Paul Valelli as member of the club's historical committee which he has been part of for the past 35 years. Paul turned over a number of important documents that he had in his possession to Bernie for transfer to safe keeping. Lastly Mario spoke of the Dark Sky bill and of successful actions taken in Connecticut in that regard.

Club Picnic Report

On June 11th 2005, the first joint picnic in ATMoB history took place with the South Shore Astronomical Society, and we had a blast! It was the first hot, sunny day of the season, but despite the heat the day was enjoyed by all. From his vantage point on the side porch, Paul Valleli estimated that there were some 80+ attendees. Also that day, thanks to an effort spearheaded by Anna Hillier, Paul received the ATMoB Club Service Award for his longevity of service to the club - over 50 years, wow! Thanks Paul! As for picnic fare, Eileen Myers brought her wonderful salmon dish, which complemented the many vittles brought by the rest of the attendees. The dessert venue was well worth more than one visit, and according to Dr. Swedlow, "one can be real bad every now and then without upsetting the system." Edible comet ice cream treats and comet fact sheets were available for junior members, in readiness for the July 4th Deep Impact. John Reed had acquired approximately 120 hamburgers and several packages of 'dogs', which he proceeded to move along atop the grill in his well-practiced, unique manner.

Bruce Gerhard and Berger set up the club tent awning. And before the arrival of guests, several members including Bruce G, Dave Siegrist, Karen and Art Swedlow, John Blomquist and Dick Koolish, moved tables and cleaned and ordered the rest of the accoutrements of the clubhouse (garbage bins, chairs, etc). Eileen arrived with a carload of picnic supplies, and with all the helpers unloading and setup went quickly.

When the proceedings were well under way, John B. and Bruce G. set up their scopes for solar viewing. In the morning there were heavy clouds, but by afternoon they had cleared enough to make it possible to view the sun. Three different types of solar filters were available: hydrogen alpha and Thousand Oaks glass, both on John Blomquist's G11 mount, and Bruce G's Baader mylar filter. This made it possible for people to compare the views through all three.

People congregated under the tent to schmooze in relative shade. Folks from the South Shore Club said they were impressed by our facility. It was good seeing Ted Poulos and Vlad Vudler, who seemed to be very much back in the swim of things. Victor Anderson was seen to dive bomb the food table for a second (or was it third) time: a sure sign of the success of the culinary portion of the afternoon's activities....it was, after all, a picnic. After the peak heat of the day, 24 stalwart astronomers, junior astronomers, and family members climbed the infamous Haystack Hill: viewing along the way the Westford Radio Telescope bubble, the Firepond Optical Facility, the Lincoln Laboratory Space Surveillance 25 meter radio telescope, and the Millstone Hill Observatory 46 meter, steerable antenna and 67 meter, zenith antenna. At the top, the huge Haystack bubble overshadowed the ground level twin parabolic reflector display; this display was especially enjoyed by the junior members, who whispered to each other via the separated parabolic reflectors.

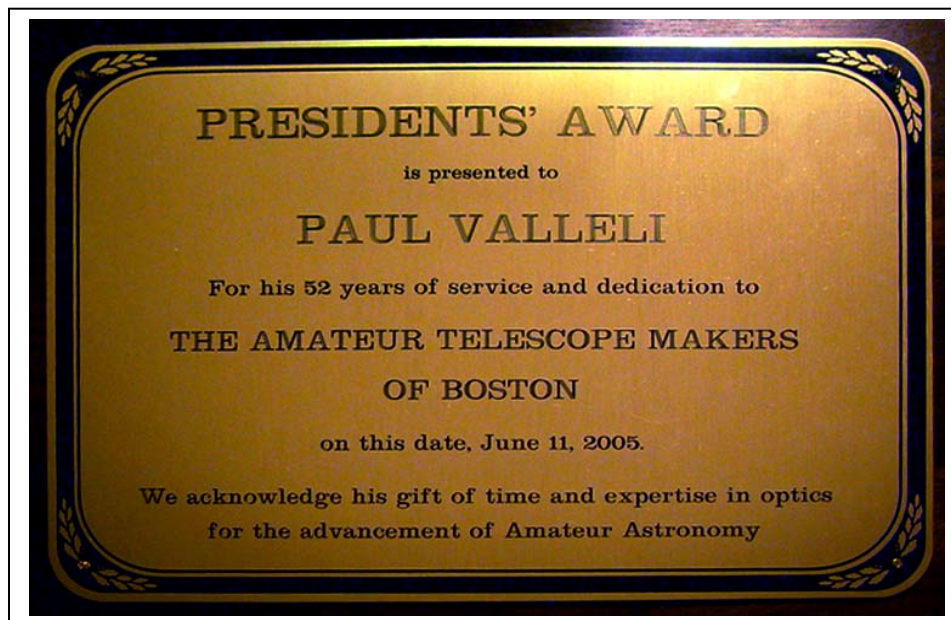
