

This Month's Meeting...

OUR OCTOBER meeting will feature Dr. Rudy Schild, whose talk is titled "The Universe is my Telescope: Gravitational Lenses and Microlensing".

Dr Schild received his BS, MS, and PhD degrees from the University of Chicago/ Yerkes Observatory. After three years of post doctorate work at Mt. Wilson-Mt Palomar, he moved to the CFA where he has remained since, studying stellar and extra-galactic spectra, and deep quasar images. He has numerous CCD images published in various astronomy magazines including Sky & Telescope. He is on the advisory board of CCD Astronomy magazine as well.

Dr Schild's research on gravitational lenses and microlensing is well known to the ATMoB as he last spoke to us in 1993 on this subject, and generated much discussion and controversy. With his ideas and principal results becoming increasingly accepted, he promises to be less controversial but no less interesting in his presentation.

Our September Meeting...

THE MEETING was opened by President Mario Motta. There was no Secretary's report, and a partial treasurer's report was given by Bernie Volz, who reported he is still in transition with outgoing treasurer Tony Costanzo.

Anna Hillier gave the first Club Historian report, thanking Barbara Welther of the Center for Astrophysics for her help. She reported her expenses to date, including \$26 spent to get four Xerox copies of a preliminary club history.

There was a brief discussion about getting more copies made for interested members to purchase. Membership

Secretary Mark Bruckner reported 119 renewals so far out of last year's over 260 members.

Mario discussed the possibility of extending the November Sky & Telescope renewal date to January next year. Since the magazine is now sent out earlier, many members start getting "your subscription is about to end" notices before they get a chance to renew their ATM membership.

Several upcoming star parties were discussed by Mario, Peter Bealo and others. Mario also mentioned that A. Walter Everest (Jr.) is considering a donation of his father's 12 1/2" scope to the club. His father was a pioneer telescope maker, and the telescope was brought to the first Stellafane, and was tested by Porter, who said it had a 1/40th wave figure. He also has a 20" f4.5 mirror in the fine grinding phase that Mario thought might be donated to the Spring-field Telescope Makers. This mirror was one of the test pours for the Palomar 200".

Mario recently met with the new director of the Maria Mitchell Observatory, who said she is having trouble with their drive corrector. Anyone who has one available to donate should contact Mario. He also described his view of Saturn's ring edge-on on August 11, saying it was barely visible. Tal Mentall reported seeing three moons near Saturn, and Joe Rothchild reported trying but being unable to see comet Hale-Bopp.

Mario announced an Executive Board meeting at his house for Sunday, September 24. Under "Old Business", Ed Dougherty reported an error in a listing of a clubhouse payment (he didn't get it), and Steve Mock described the annual Baxter State Park dark sky trip as having good transparency but bad seeing.

Ed Los described an upcoming Boy Scout Jamboree star party that could have as many as 3000 attendees, a September 23 Gunstock mountain star party was mentioned, and Tanya Vudler announced an October 17 (rain date October 24) star party to be held in Lexington.

Vladimir Vudler described a spectacular solar prominence recently seen, and showed some extremely bright phosphorescent material.

Ed Dougherty proposed that the club consider selling him the evaporator, since he feels that there isn't as much telescope and CCD camera making as there once was at the clubhouse.

Dick Koolish showed slides of the clubhouse porch reconstruction, and Paul Ciccetti described the process of rebuilding, and thanked the helpers.

In the "Members Showcase" part of the meeting, Mario showed slides of his observatory and 32" telescope, as well as a number of deep sky objects taken with the scope, including the elusive Stephan's Quintet.

Bernie Volz showed some photos taken piggyback on the scope, and photos of the MIR and Space Shuttle rendezvous.

Our featured speaker, Dr Heidi Hamel of MIT gave an enthusiastic and entertaining description of the Comet Shoemaker-Levy Jupiter encounter.

TREASURER'S REPORT

For the period from July 1st to September 28, we have \$175.67 in income and \$1,090.62 in expenses (over \$600 of which was for the clubhouse). We presently have \$3,714.36 in the checking account and \$5,800 in a CD account, for a total of \$9,514.36. This does NOT include membership renewal dues and donations which have been paid to the Membership Secretary for this year.

Executive Board Meeting...

THE EXECUTIVE Board met at my home on September 24th and discussed a 16 point agenda, including clubhouse reports and finance. The following have been voted on and passed:

1. We have voted to create a web page for the ATM's A club member, Brewster LaMaccia has graciously donated computer space at his business to host our web page, and I have appointed Brewster the Sysop for this enterprise. By appending our name to his current domain space, this web page will not cost the club any funds in either registration fees or computer hardware. The "web page committee" will also include Dick Koolish, Peter Bealo, and myself (Mario Motta). We hope to have this fully operational by November 1st. Any ideas on what you would like on the web page, please notify us.

Bernie Volz (Treasurer) and I will meet with an accountant in October for our annual audit (required by bylaws).

3. Anna Hillier has published a preliminary draft of the club history, and it is a fine work. At the last meeting there was interest in by many members for copies. When Anna is finished, the club will publish the history and we will sell it to club members who want a copy for \$2.00 above publishing costs, (profits to the club).

4. A request has been made to sell club assets. The board has voted not to sell any club assets at this time. The clubhouse is completing a new inventory. If any materials or assets are found to be surplus, then a list of these items and fair market price will be published in starfields for members to purchase. Note that as a tax exempt organization, we cannot sell any item far below fair market value as this would jeopardize our tax status.

5. We will attempt to get our meetings listed in the Boston Globe (Calendar section) monthly. If any member wishes the same notice sent to there home newspaper and they are willing to publish it, send me the E-mail address of the publication.

Balancing a Dob...

In the January, 1993 issue of Astronomy magazine, I suggested thing the vinyl dust cover of a Dobsonian telescope over the rear end to balance finders and/or heavy eyepieces. The drawback of this technique is that the vinyl cover becomes stiff in cold weather.

Since then, we have seen the introduction of expensive Velcro strips and bean bags to accomplish the balancing act.

I now offer the simplest and least expensive solution. Strap on adjustable lap pack or fanny pack around the rear end of the telescope tube. Fill the zipper pockets with any household objects necessary to balance the load. Tools or metal spoons work well.
